Medication Reconciliation Patient Education Checklist



Use this checklist to guide a simple, patient-friendly conversation that helps ensure medicines are understood, accurate, and up to date.

□ Step 1: Gather Medicines.
□ Ask the patient: "Can you show me all the medicines you take, including vitamins and herbs?"
□ If they forget some, ask:
 "Do you take any medicine in the morning or at bedtime?" "Do you use any creams, inhalers, or injections?" "Does anyone help you with your medicine?"
Tip: If needed, ask a caregiver or family member to assist.
□ Step 2: Make the List
 □ Write down each medicine, dosage, and when they take it. □ Use simple words and/or pictures to explain. □ Ask: "Do you know why you take each medicine?" ○ If YES → Reinforce understanding. ○ If NO → Explain in simple terms.
Example: Instead of "This is an antihypertensive," say, "This helps keep your blood pressure normal.
□ Step 3: Check for Changes
□ Compare the list with past records or bottles. □ Ask:
 "Are there any medicines you stopped taking?" "Has your doctor changed your medicines recently?" "Do you have any pills that look different from before?"
Tip: If there are differences, help the patient update the list.

□ Step 4: Teach About Medicines

 $\hfill\Box$ Go through each medicine with the patient.

□ Ask:

- o "What do you know about this medicine?"
- o "Have you had any side effects?"
- "Do you ever miss doses? If so, what makes it hard to take?"

Tip: If they have trouble taking their medicine, explore solutions:

- o "Would reminders, like alarms or pillboxes, help?"
- "Would it help if a family member helped you remember?"

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□ Step 5: Give the Updated List

- □ Make sure the patient has a copy of their updated medicine list. Encourage them to:
- □ Encourage them to:
 - Keep it in their wallet or phone.
 - Bring it to all doctor visits.
 - Show it to family members or caregivers.
- □ Ask:
 - "Who helps you remember to take your medicine?"
 - "Who would you share this list with to help keep you safe?"

□ Step 6: Confirm Understanding & Encourage Engagement

- □ Ask open-ended questions to check understanding:
 - "Can you tell me how you take your medicine in your own words?"
 - "What would you do if you ran out of a medicine?"
 - "What questions do you have about your medicines?"

Tip: If they struggle to answer, re-explain in a different way.

□ Last Step: Celebrate Small Wins!

- □ Praise them for their efforts:
- □ Ask:
 - o "You're doing a great job managing your medicines!"
 - o "It's great that you're keeping track of your list. That keeps you safe!"
 - o "I can tell you care about your health—keep up the good work!"

Helping patients understand their medicines can prevent serious problems. Use this checklist regularly to keep them safe, informed, and confident in their care.
